**from the** Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, **Pastors Hello from England!** 

Pen The first month of my sabbatical is completed and it was wonderful. When I first arrived I made a personal pilgrimage to Monte Cassino. I walked out to the Commonwealth War Cemetery and prayed for the repose of the souls of those lying there who paid the ultimate price for peace and freedom. Then I went up to the Abbey, which was destroyed in World War Two, but completely rebuilt, in the words of the Abbot at the time, "where it was and as it was". It is stunningly beautiful. Interestingly, the most important part of the Abbey, the tombs of St. Benedict and his sister, St. Scholastica, were not destroyed. A bomb lodged in the steps of the sanctuary, mere yards away, but did not explode.

On September 2 I began the first course of my sabbatical at the Pontifical North American College. The community of priests on sabbatical at the NAC was warm, friendly, and welcoming. The studies on St. Paul were enlightening, and will, hopefully, make for better preaching when I get home. No promises on that account!

We enjoyed a pilgrimage to Cyprus in the footsteps of St. Paul and St. Barnabas, and celebrated Mass behind the Church where the Tomb of St. Barnabas lies. We couldn't celebrate in the church because it is in the Turkish occupied area of Cyprus and Christian worship is illegal; the church remains open as a museum. It felt rather like the experience of the early Christians. We had a very nervous Cypriot tour guide keeping watch as we celebrated Mass.

Rome is a wonderful education, and faith experience, in itself. Everywhere you turn there are reminders of the victory of Christ. It's good to be reminded that Christ and His Gospel will always be triumphant over any forces ranged against them. One of the most moving experiences I had was at the tomb of St. Monica. I prayed there for my dear ones, and yours, who have fallen away from the Church. If Monica could make a saint out of her wayward son, St. Augustine, then there is always hope for our dear ones too.

I would be dishonest if I let you believe that it has all been work. The fraternity has been wonderful, and, of course, being in Italy the food and wine aren't too bad either. I've developed a taste for gelato - I try a new flavour every time. If it weren't for that, I'd be coming home in great shape as we walk everywhere and that involves a lot of hills and lots of steps.

I just arrived in England for the second phase of my sabbatical. I'm beginning my journey here where the Christian faith was first brought to these shores at Ramsgate. It was near here that St. Augustine, the first Archbishop of Canterbury, made his first English convert and had his first discussion with King, later Saint, Ethelbert. I've been very warmly received at the National Shrine of St. Augustine in Ramsgate, and offered Mass there on Sunday morning. Also on Sunday I was privileged to attend a beautiful service of Evensong at Canterbury Cathedral, and then prayed at the "Martyrdom", the spot where St. Thomas Becket was martyred, and where St. John Paul II prayed for Church unity during his visit to Canterbury.

You are all in my prayers every day. I hope that you all have a Happy Thanksgiving. I'm sorry to be missing Thanksgiving at home, but I'll make up for it with extra turkey at Christmas.
